

For CAP, the Numbers Tell the FY2022 Story



By all accounts, fiscal 2022 was a banner year for CAP. Consider these significant year-end milestones:

- 60,125 members, including 25,000 cadets. That's a 6.5% increase in membership over the previous Sept. 30. Most notably, it pushes CAP back over the 60,000 mark and indicates a complete rebound from the membership decline experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 151 lives saved. That speaks for itself. Because of CAP technology that includes cellphone forensics and radar analysis, along with search and rescue aircrews and ground teams, 151 people are alive today. As credited by the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center, that's the fourth-highest year for lives saved in our recorded history.
- 9,202 units of blood collected. This milestone is also a high mark for CAP, by a large margin. These blood units collected by Operation Pulse Lift over the past year also saved lives up to three per unit, according to the American Red Cross and moved the mission closer to its goal of 16,667 units by the end of the calendar year.
- 2,540 certificated VFR pilots and 62 new Cadet Wings pilots. CAP's pilot proficiency program has added about a hundred experienced pilots, and dozens more earned their private pilot certificates through the Cadet Wings Program.

CAP Going to the Dogs (Part 2) CAP's Canine Volunteer Partners Take to the Air

Editor's Note: The <u>lead article in the Summer 2022 issue of Bear Facts</u> (Part 1) reported on Group 2's February 2022 training exercise with CARDA, which was the first such training mission since the pandemic. Since its publication, CARDA representatives (including canine members of CARDA) have visited a number of squadron meetings throughout the Wing to explain how the dogs are trained and to answer questions from rapt audiences. This is a follow-up article on a more recent CARDA/CAP training exercise.

Please note that one result of the transition from a printed/mailed magazine to a digital version is the ability to include more color photos and to include linked videos, a capability we exploit in this article.

Aircrew from across Northern California geared up on 22 July 2023 to support a long-standing partner of CAP, the California Rescue Dog Association (CARDA). CARDA's mission is to train, certify, and deploy highly-qualified search dog teams to assist law enforcement and other public safety agencies in the search for lost and

missing persons. Of the three search dog groups in California that directly support the State of California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES), CARDA is the largest and most geographically dispersed. CARDA provides search dog services to all public service agencies at no charge.

The Northern California part of this July training mission had been postponed earlier in the year due to weather. Aircraft from Concord, San Jose, Santa Rosa and South Lake Tahoe hosted a dozen experienced handlers. The goal of the training mission was to familiarize both handlers and dogs and prepare for future search missions supported by CARDA.

Trained specialist dogs are a familiar sight to many CAP Emergency Services ground team search missions when working alongside local emergency services personnel, such as the county sheriff's department. Operating in an area search or specific target search role, these unique animals come into their own with their highly developed tracking skills.

CARDA dogs and handlers do train regularly with other emergency services departments, and many

have flown in helicopters. The smaller fixed-wing aircraft flown by CAP create a new experience for many of these dogs. Handlers need to know that they will be ready and prepared for their search mission when they land. That means they need to be comfortable and undistracted by the experience of flying in a CAP plane. This training helps them maintain their focus.


All those who participated agreed that the training flights provided by CAP across several Northern California locations were invaluable in preparing dogs and handlers for the tasks. Specifically, these flights help some CARDA dog handlers with passing their required Mission Ready certification for Cal OES.

A previous canine visitor from a similar 2022 CARDA training mission was "Yipi," a Kelpie-mix puppy, with her CARDA handler Kathy Gaughen, who brought 18 years of experience in searches. She explained: "This is the best time to start the dog's training, although we do sometimes bring dogs into the program that are a little older—but generally before age two."

The biggest takeaway from the training event was that CAP volunteers are out supporting fellow CARDA volunteers in support of the shared public safety mission. When the next real search arrives, we all know we'll both be ready.

The Cadets of Delta Flight were getting ready for their upcoming squadron inspection. Some of the cadets had made many improvements since Day 0, and started to adjust to this temporary way of life known as Encampment. Some still needed a little more encouragement and guidance.

At the Wing's annual Encampment, cadets are challenged to adapt to a culture that emphasizes unfamiliar norms and benchmarks. Cadets undergo many challenges to meet the "Encampment Standard." A few moments later the cadets returned with the requested items in hand.

Senior Member Mancebo sat down and began to teach these cadets how to shine their boots properly. He gave some advice and taught some techniques to get their boots to really sparkle. Now me, personally,


I always thought I had a really good shine on my boots. That is, of course, until I met Senior Member Mancebo. One day during Encampment I was sitting on the steps outside the barracks shining my boots,

When Senior Member Mancebo was done, they all went back to their duties, and they thanked Senior Member Mancebo for his valuable lessons. It's these positive moments in the course of their Encampment week that I know each one of these cadets will value and remember. I know I will as well.

Inaugural Cadet Speech Competition

All 52 Civil Air Patrol wings and 8 CAP regions host a cadet competition each year to determine which cadet team will ultimately represent their wings and regions at the National Cadet Competition (NCC). Core events reflect the range of challenges cadets face at the unit level, including Inspection, Written Exam, Physical Fitness, Team Leadership Problem(s), and various drill and color guard events. Since 2015, NCC has added a number of elective competitive events that reflect the CAP Cadet Program and emerging learning priorities. For the 2023 competition, a Public Speaking component was included for the first time.

For the California Wing (CAWG) Cadet Competition, each contestant in this inaugural event was asked to provide their views on the topic "Civil Air Patrol - Why We Do What We Do." The winner within each group was selected by the Group Commander, and the wing finalist was selected by the Wing Commander after they presented their speeches at the 2023 CAWG Cadet Programs Conference (CPC) in March. The excellence of the presentation was judged, as well as the text of each speech. As the CAWG winner, Cadet Stienhans received a partial scholarship to an upcoming National Cadet Special Activities (NCSA) or other CAP sponsored event. She will also have an opportunity to compete—presenting her perspective on CAP—at the regional competition, and the winner will go on to the national (NCC) contest.

The text of Cadet Stienhans' speech reads:

Good evening esteemed ladies and gentlemen, and good evening CWC 2023!

"Aspire to inspire: why we do what we do in Civil Air Patrol"

What Does "Aspire" Mean?

This word is a verb that means "to have a strong desire to achieve a goal or to become something."

Aerospace education – What we aspire & how we inspire?



EMERGENCY SERVICES

- Conducts 85% of inland search and rescue in the U.S. as tasked by the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center and other agencies. CAP supported 455 SAR missions last year.
- Coordinates Air Force-assigned missions through CAP National Operations Center at Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama, at a cost of about \$170 per flying hour.
- Has 5,600 aircrew members and 37,000 emergency responders trained to Federal Emergency Management Agency standards.

- Offers orientation flights in powered aircraft and gliders and also offers flight training scholarships.
- Provides activities and competitions for cadets at the local, state, regional, and national levels.
- Makes opportunities for community involvement available through color guard/drill teams and emergency service missions.
- · Exposes thousands of cadets to cyber defense careers through CyberPatriot, the Air and Space Forces Association's National Youth Cyber Security Competition.
- Inspires CAP cadets to attend all service academies. CAP cadets constitute approximately 10% percent of each U.S. Air Force Academy class.
- · Produces cadets who enlist in the Air Force, U.S. Army, and U.S. Coast Guard at a higher pay grade if they have earned the Gen. Billy Mitchell Award.
- Awards scholarships in flight and academic opportunities to help enhance the nation's future workforce.







CADET PROGRAMS

Today's Cadets, Tomorrow's Aerospace Leaders

Civil Air Patrol's cadet program is unlike any other because CAP features resources, traditions, training, education, and flight opportunities no other youth program can match. With no obligation to join the military, CAP weaves military traditions into leadership training, confidence building, character development, physical fitness, aerospace education, cyberspace activities, and other experiences that have proven to change the trajectory of lives for youth ages 12–18.

Former Civil Air Patrol cadets include Rhodes scholars, Medal of Honor recipients, four-star generals, aviation pioneers and astronauts, scientists, explorers, innovators, and military leaders.

YOUTH AVIATION INITIATIVE

The Youth Aviation Initiative is one aspect of the cadet experience that sets Civil Air Patrol's youth programs apart. In addition to numerous encampments and special activities designed to introduce cadets to new experiences and explore career opportunities, the Youth Aviation Initiative provides hands-on opportunities to explore aviation in-flight.

Civil Air Patrol's orientation flight program offers 10 introductory flights to each CAP cadet—five conducted in a powered aircraft and five in gliders. During these flights, cadets have the chance to take the controls and fly the aircraft. In fiscal year 2022, CAP pilots flew a combined total of more than 30,000 orientation flights.

NATIONAL FLIGHT ACADEMIES

The Youth Aviation Initiative includes a number of innovative CAP programs, such as Cadet Takeoff (TOP), which allows cadets the opportunity to attend a week-long flight academy. National Flight Academies offered periodically throughout the United States introduce cadets to both powered and glider flight operations and ground school. Many cadets will solo or be ready to solo after the flight academy training.



CADET WINGS

Civil Air Patrol's Cadet Wings program is funded by the U.S. Air Force and a grant from the James C. Ray Foundation with the primary objective of training pilots. Cadet Wings picks up where National Flight Academies end, taking students who have soloed through approximately 60 hours of training, preparation, and check ride to be private pilots.



Cadet Wings is a highly competitive program that includes a rigorous application process evaluating cadet eligibility

based on CAP experience, academic record, and aviation qualification and knowledge. Many cadets are instructed by Civil Air Patrol flight instructors in CAP aircraft. Others train at local flight schools. Regardless of where training occurs, all Cadet Wings student pilots receive mentorship and guidance from members of the Youth Aviation Initiative panel, experts in aviation training and aviation careers. The mentorship of these individuals is what sets Cadet Wings apart from general

aviation scholarships. CAP invests in their development as citizens and contributors to the aviation industry. Cadet Wings also offers selection for in-residence opportunities. A high percentage of cadets that graduate from Cadet Wings with their Private Pilot Certificate (PPC) continue to pursue careers in general aviation, commercial aviation, and service academies.

The most compelling aspects of Civil Air Patrol's Cadet Wings programs are these:

In addition to the aviation-based activities and national academies that set Civil Air Patrol apart from other youth programs, CAP cadets can explore diverse and dynamic opportunities through National Cyber Academy, International Air Cadet Exchange, Pararescue and Survival Orientation Course, Space Command Familiarization Course, Civic Leadership Academy, Honor Guard Academy, National Blue Beret, Hawk Mountain Rescue Academy, Cadet Officer School, Engineering Technologies (robotics) Academy, Aircraft Maintenance & Manufacturing Academy, Noncommissioned Officer School, and more.

CYBER SECURITY TRAINING

CyberPatriot is the National Youth Cyber Education Program created by the Air & Space Force Association to inspire K-12 students toward careers in cybersecurity or other science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) disciplines. At the core of the program is the National Youth Cyber Defense Competition, the nation's largest cyber defense competition, which puts high school and middle school students in charge of securing virtual networks.

Authorized by the California State Legislature in May 1939, the first annual Mariposa County Fair was held in October 1939. CAP was glad to be asked to partic-

SCOPE and the fair administration had nothing but praise for Squadron 1850 in their volunteer service and professionalism. One member of SCOPE offered to sponsor a cadet for their entire cadet career! Squadron 1850 provided over 200 hours of community service over the 4 days of the Fair.

A Retrospective on the Last 4 Years of Emergency Services

Editor's Note: On 21 October 2023 at the California Wing Conference, Lt. Col. Christian reminisced over the course of his tenure as CAWG Director of Emergency Services.



My hesitation about taking on the role of Wing Director of Emergency Services (ES) four years ago was fundamentally that we had inherited a well-functioning wing: nothing was broken and nothing needed to be fixed. I didn't want to break something that was already working well. My ES background was with a squadron where members showed up to a SAREX early, and they left late. And then they planned for the next day's operational period. People would work all day at work, and be ready to answer phones at all hours of the night. I saw pilots who launched in inclement weather to try to accomplish a rescue or bring closure to the family of a lost airman. I knew what California Wing members were capable of. I served on a lot of membership boards, and I heard this common theme: the incoming members explained that they were now in a position where they could give back and serve their community—and have fun doing it. And it was that context of volunteerism that helped frame my conversations with Ross about my position.

It was within this context that we discussed what it was that we could do. One thing I came up with was that the members were looking for an opportunity. If you give them meaningful work they always respond to the occasion—they will respond 100%. If I had a pie chart, it would show one color—100%. If we can capture some new opportunities, we needed to be a wing that had more to do than Search and Rescue (SAR). We wished to shift our SAR work portfolio toward disaster response; we knew that it was an emerging field that would be meaningful to the membership, and we knew that there was value to the community there.

So we went to talk to different agencies and agency representatives, including the general in charge of the California National Guard. The general and his colonels and staff were there to hear from us about what we could do, and we had to make some promises about our ability to perform—that we are reliable and professional, that we can do it safely, and that you will appreciate the product that we will deliver to you. I promised that (and I did so without hesitation—without any reservation whatsoever in my mind) because I knew from my previous experience that the members cared about the type of work that we wanted to do and they would absolutely step up and achieve it. And you did! And it gave us all the momentum that we needed in order to market our ES services. To go out and visit with agencies, capture that work, and bring it back for the members and for our organization within the Wing. Disaster response is a tough market: it is a really tough market. It is through your efforts, through your skills, innovations, preparedness, and ability to execute—time and time again—that we were able to go out and capture new work and bring it back to this wing.

Not four months into Colonel Veta's tenure, COVID came into our lives. And our first reaction was, "This derails all our plans." But the pandemic turned out to be an opportunity, and again the members demonstrated that they could perform in an outstanding fashion. We had roughly 600 members across the state working in food banks contributing thousands of volunteer hours, delivering hundreds of thousands

Four months into my tenure, it was unbelievable support: we were supporting the Red Cross and LA County. We were doing food bank support in the Central Valley; it was an amazing thing to watch.

Not long after that, we obtained some new technology; we obtained WALDO cameras from National Headquarters. And the things showed up on the front porch: it was great, but what did it do? It came without a manual or any guidance. So, what did you do? You wrote the book. You figured out how to use it, and you taught what you had learned throughout the Wing. And barely two or three weeks later, we had massive wildfires in Northern California and the Central Valley. So, we photographed several thousand square kilometers of burn scar area. And we did it during the day, processed it overnight, and damage assessment by the National Guard began at 0700 the following morning. In less than a 24-hour turnaround, we were providing damage assessments! There were other teams that the customer had used in the past where it would take them months to do the same thing. But again, you adapted, and you outperformed, and you impressed the heck out of everyone.

Our counterdrug program has been incredibly successful, and the Coast Guard requested us by name for aerial support because they enjoy working with us so much. I don't know how to say in words how proud I am of everything the Wing has accomplished in Disaster Relief. Our SAR program hours are in decline. But we are still a very capable, premiere, SAR organization within this state and it is why the state contracts with us and it one of the ties we have to the State of California. They know that we have the capability, and that we have the people who are dedicated to the task and will perform to the very best of their capabilities—and deliver. They are professional, reliable, and repeatable. And everyone sees it.

How many of you have flown on our WADS missions? We do those almost every week. We are out there flying alongside fighter jets and training the military. They trust us—enough to fly their jets very close to us. It is a hazardous environment, and they don't trust anyone else to do this.

The reason we have these opportunities, the reason I was able to go and pitch the capabilities of Civil Air Patrol, was because I had absolute confidence in the members being always be able to perform and deliver. I really want to take this opportunity to say, "Thank you."

The last four years as ES Director has at times been difficult. I felt like a therapist some of the time. The passions run high in this organization; you are here because you are passionate about what you do. And perhaps equally passionate when things are not going the way you think they should. This is okay. But what I do want to say though is that I truly appreciate everything you have done. And I appreciate all the support that Col. Veta provided over the last four years. Your efforts are incredibly valuable and very much appreciated all throughout this wing. Our job within the ES Directorate—as we saw it—was to support you, and I truly hope that we were able to do that. For the future, under new leadership by Mark Wheeler, his team, and our new Wing Commander, I know that if you give them your support, we will be able to bring in new business and find new ways to participate that excite you, that challenge you. And please give yourselves a round of applause, and thank you very much for everything you have done.

The CAWG Group Challenge – Competing for Success

An anonymous author once wrote, "The best part of competition is that through it, we discover what we are capable of and how much more we can actually do than we ever believed possible."

As the incredible 2023 California Wing (CAWG) Encampment drew to an end, returning cadets and senior members added yet another activity to the California Wing's rich history of developing leaders. Unbeknownst to them, a new challenge was silently brewing in the background. On August 5th, a singular social media post teased the unveiling of a brand new contest, one that the Wing had never seen before. The very next day, CAWG Public Affairs officially announced the kickoff for the 2023 California Wing Group vs. Group Challenge, also known simply as the CAWG Group Challenge.

Lasting just over a month, the CAWG Group Challenge quickly became the Wing's biggest remote competition since the 2020 Cadets vs. Senior Members PT Challenge, which encouraged members to stay healthy and active during the COVID-19 Pandemic. Each of CAWG's eight groups were pitted against each other in a friendly competition in an attempt to "Race to the Top", echoing the Challenge's motto. Across the span of four weeks, members were challenged to aim for new heights and to propel their group to the top of three different categories:

Physical Training. Each week was dedicated to a specific exercise, and weekly winners were announced throughout the Challenge. The order of exercises (pushups, jumping jacks, sit-ups, and mile runs) encouraged the importance of a healthy and active lifestyle in the spirit of competition.

Volunteer Service. Echoing our Core Value, members were tasked with serving their local community through non-profit organization/activities and volunteer efforts. Every recorded hour contributed to the CAWG Group Challenge, additionally bringing members closer to earning the coveted CAP Community Service ribbon.


Book Reading. An area untouched before, the Book Reading category encouraged members to learn through the mighty power of physical books rather than using electronic devices to read stories. Members could read anything from leadership, aerospace, history, and fiction to contribute to the Challenge.

Dozens of squadrons across the Wing banded together, and the CAWG Group Challenge was underway. The rules were simple – every completed book, volunteer hour, and exercise counted as a point towards a group's total number of points in each category. Submission sheets were released at the end of each week, allowing members to submit their results and contribute to their group's total point tally.

The competition started with significant participation, and its momentum accelerated with every passing week:

Week 1 (6 - 12 Aug) started off strong, with Group 2 winning the pushup requirement with more than double the next highest tally number.

- o Inland Empire Group 3 = 1,661 points
- o Central Coast Group 4 = 1,619 points
- o Central California Group 6 = 1,283 points
- o South Coast Group 7 = 700 points
- o NorCal Group 5 = 464 points



CAP TOP Flights Bringing Educators into CAP Introducing Educators to the Joy of Flying

One of the three pillars of Civil Air Patrol is the Aerospace Education mission. We are raising up a new generation of pilots, aerospace engineers and technicians through our support and engagement with cadets and our support of STEM study.

To engage educators across public, private, parochial, and home schooling is the focus of our Air Force-funded TOP (Teacher Orientation Program) flights.

What is the program and why? CAP's TOP (Teacher Orientation Program) Flight was created to bring

educators—whether from public, private, parochial, or home school—into our CAP organization through first-hand experience of flying with our mission pilots and our aircraft. The vast majority of our nation's teachers have never flown in a small plane, let alone an unpowered glider.

Their experience of what may be their first flight in a piston powered small plane or a glider, as well as their first contact with CAP, may broaden their knowledge of what CAP is about. It could even be a life-changing experience! This first experience is meant to be shared with their students and school and to imbue the importance and excitement of aerospace education and STEM subjects.

Where funding is available, powered and non-powered CAP aircraft can be both experienced by our educators.

When TOP was created in 2004, it was at that time a "Class C" mission and as such received minimal funding. However, in 2019 it was designated by the Air Force as a "Class A" mission with a major increase in funding to expand the program participants and pilot availability. All CAP pilots rated for cadet orientation flights are now eligible to fly the TOP flights, and the Air Force funds this program across all CAP wings.

How does the TOP program work within CAWG? Maj. Catherine Collom, our DAE (Director of Aerospace Education), is responsible for ensuring that all teachers enrolled in the Aerospace Education Member (AEM) program have the opportunity to schedule a TOP flight. Her Deputy Director, Maj. Mark Fridell, is the point-of-contact for coordinating the flights for the AEMs.

The process for an educator normally consists of local CAP members talking with local educators and introducing them to the program. Signing up a teacher to become an AEM will give them a CAPID and allow them access to our CAP eServices Website for a modest cost of \$35. These educators can then order STEM kits and access the multiple resources available to their students. The member that introduced the educator should follow up and contact Maj. Fridell to initiate the request for the TOP flight. If an educator finds the AEM program through the CAP national website, they will be directed to Maj. Collom. Maj. Collom is responsible for connecting the educator with a CAP member in their local area so they get the personal attention deserved.

Most of our CAWG squadrons will have an Aerospace Education officer to assist the educator in the process. Maj. Fridell can be reached by CAP email (mark.fridell@cawgcap.org) or via his phone at

925.872.8111. He will assist the squadron and/or the educator in signing-up as well as coordinating the TOP flight. For Southern California, 1st Lt. John Rochford, as well as Capt. Frank Bagheri, will coordinate for the actual TOP Flight schedules and logistics. Northern California will have a different operations team(s) for flights, and will be coordinated by Maj. Fridell.

Susan Broderick Mallett is a retired teacher, administrator, and university instructor with an educational tenure of 31 years in Alabama schools. As a public school principal, she led a nationally and internationally-recognized elementary school that integrated an aerospace theme throughout the curriculum. Since 2006 she has served as the Educational Outreach and Air Force Association (AFA) Programs Coordinator at the National HQ of the Civil Air Patrol at Maxwell Air Force Base, AL.

When asked about CAP TOP flights, Mrs. Mallet adds her insight.

"CAP's Teacher Orientation Program (TOP) flights are a unique opportunity to put CAP educator members at the controls of a CAP airplane in flight, which allows them to connect STEM principles they teach with a first-hand knowledge of related aviation principles. It is hoped that prior to their flight, the teachers can obtain and practice on a CAP Flight Simulator STEM Kit, provided free to CAP squadrons and educator members at no cost. Additive is the pilot's pre-flight briefing which gives a clear description and demonstration of the airplane's control surfaces prior to the teachers using the actual control features in the cockpit to see and feel how the airplane is maneuvered in flight. Teachers sharing their flight experience with their students via video, photos, or live streaming, gives the students a better understanding of and interest in aviation and possible related career opportunities. Many times, the pilot will conduct a follow-on visit to the classroom to give a broader explanation of the many aspects of aviation while also sharing the benefits of CAP's cadet programs with the students. Ultimately, TOP flights are a key component in helping both teachers and students gain an appreciation for and interest in aviation and CAP's missions for America."

1st Lt. John Rochford of Group 1's Squadron 35 has conducted several recent TOP flights. He adds:

"Since becoming a Civil Air Patrol Mission Pilot in 2022, I've had the opportunity to participate in the TOP Flight program on two occasions now. I meet the teachers at an airport close to their school and introduce them to the plane by including them in a pre-flight inspection. We take off and head to their school so that we can fly over the school at a prearranged time so that their students can greet them from the ground. Each teacher takes a turn in the front seat so that they can fly the plane and experience the thrill of flight. The teachers take this experience back to their classrooms to share with their students, which hopefully sparks an interest with the students to pursue STEM-type activities. The teachers in the program are also given STEM kits by the Air Force to conduct experiments with their student to help spark that interest."

The reach of this program can be expanded if we as CAP members contact all the educators that we know personally. We all know educators, whether from our own family education history, or friends and neighbors. If each of our members reaches out to these folks and discusses this important program, it should result in many more educators taking advantage of TOP flights.

Maj. Collum has a simple message to introduce the idea to prospective TOP flight participants. She poses the question:

"How does an educator get a free orientation flight? Civil Air Patrol has a special program for educators which entitles them to a free orientation flight in one of our CAP aircraft. An educator can sign up for a minimum fee and become what is known as an Aerospace Education Member (AEM). Along with all the other benefits of the program, a free orientation flight, known as a TOP flight (Teachers Orientation Program flight), is included."

With a severe shortage of commercial and military pilots, our TOP flights are one way to increase the interest of students in our cadet programs as well as STEM subjects in general.

Successfully completing a Region Cadet Leadership School (RCLS) is a requirement to earn the Eaker Award.

On June 19-29, 2023, two cadets from California Wing Group 2, C/Maj Liam McKinnon (squadron 13) and C/Capt Grace Muresan (squadron 10), attended the RCLS held by the the University of Rocky Mountain at the US Air Force Academy campus in Colorado Springs. They learned Officership and Character standard and responsibilities, Comunication skills as a leader, Interpersonal Relations to improve their mentoring, coaching, supervising, and disciplining techniques, Critical and Creative thinking, and Leadership Theory that can help them lead indirectly through delegation.

McKinnon said that the school was well run and organized, and that his most favorite part was getting to know cadets from other wings who had completely different backgrounds but still had the same goals and enthusiasm to thrive at CAP. He added, "My advice for any CAWG cadets going to events outside of the wing is to keep an open mind because sometimes events are run differently. Use this fact to learn and grow as a leader and a cadet." Muresan, who won the Best Essayst Award, agreed "I got the chance to use interpersonal relations techniques taught in the program, to convince my opposing-views team mates, to agree on the crucial points that I proposed." She continued, "I agree with McKinnon. Attending outside of wing schools will contribute significantly to the awareness of diversity and maturity of your leadership skills."

C/Lt Col Terrance Fung (squadron 25, group 3) and C/1st Lt Isaiah Gonzalez (squadron 144, group 8) also attended the RCLS as instructors and both received Commanders' Commendation awards. Fung advised, "For CAWG attendees, prepare to drop the stigma and ego as a cadet officer. You will soon learn that everyone at RMR RCLS work together and the environment is much more relaxed. Although you should still be professional and competent, the culture of RMR is extremely different. Don't be afraid to make friends with your fellow officers and develop a relationship between you and your seminar leader so they can further guide you along your CAP career." Gonzalez added, "I think to get the best out of CAP, a cadet should figure out the why first. Why do you want to join CAP? Once you know what you want to achieve, find a mentor, be coachable and adaptable, and work your way up and around. RMR RCLS strengthened my belief in this view."




